
Section 1: Vowel and Consonant Chunks

1. Read the story to your student.
2. Read it together slowly. Have the student point to each word as you read.
3. Together, find and mark all the **vowel chunks** and **consonant chunks**. Use yellow for vowel chunks and blue for consonant chunks.

The Liberty Bell stands for freedom. There are words on the front of the bell. They say, "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land." The bell proclaimed liberty when it was rung. One day it cracked. Even though people tried to fix it, the crack became worse. The Liberty Bell isn't rung now. But it still proclaims liberty. It still stands for freedom.

1. Read the story to your student.
2. Read it together slowly. Have the student point to each word as you read.
3. This week you and your student will be marking all six letter patterns that you have learned. They are vowel chunks (yellow), consonant chunks (blue), Bossy r chunks (purple), Tricky y Guy (green), endings (pink or red), and silent letters (orange). (Note: The word *view* has overlapping vowel chunks. You may choose whichever one you prefer.)
